## 5. Fire-fighting measures

## 7. Handling and storage

### Precautions for safe handling

### Exposure controls

#### **Appropriate engineering controls**

Provide adequate ventilation. Observe any occupational exposure limits for the product or ingredients. Use process enclosures, local exhaust ventilation or other engineering controls as the primary means to minimize worker exposure. Ensure control measures are regularly inspected and maintained.

#### **Eye/face protection**
